MESSAGE FROM MAYOR STAPLES

The past couple of months have taken me to a number of places, from small towns to large cities. In every one of them, I witnessed stark reminders of the homelessness and opioid crises. I also walked through beautiful parks, appreciated vibrant murals, independent storefronts, and restaurants filled with people.

As I write this, I am settled at one of my favourite coffee shops in Vancouver reviewing the 2023 Duncan Citizen Satisfaction Survey results. Like every place I have been to throughout Vancouver Island and other parts of Canada, people in Duncan are feeling the impacts of homelessness and opioid abuse.

We continue to work tirelessly with neighbouring municipalities and nations to encourage and support the Province of BC in addressing these crises. In fact, at various times I have tried to calculate the number of hours that we, City Council and staff, have spent on this work, but it has become so deeply embedded in almost every conversation we have that there is no way to come to an accurate number.

We have found incredible success in Cowichan with the Village on Trunk Road. We have evidence that it works; now we need to build on this success by getting Provincial support for this model and expanding rehabilitation and mental health support programs. The longer we have to wait, the more we will watch people we love suffer, the more funerals we will attend, and the more all of us will continue to be deeply impacted by the fallout of these crises.

We all deserve a home, a safe community, and adequate support to address our health and wellbeing. And while we continue to invest our time and resources into the above, we will also keep planting flowers, painting murals, walking in parks, gathering together for coffee and food, supporting local businesses, and caring for each other.



DUNCAN ACCESSIBILITY PLAN

On July 17, 2023, Council endorsed its inaugural Duncan Accessibility Plan, representing our commitment to continuous improvement on the policies, practices, and built environment that impact our citizens and employees to remove and prevent barriers to full participation with our organization.

CURRENT CONSTRUCTION & ROAD WORKS UPDATE

- The City is excited to be entering the detailed design and construction phase of the Station Street Placemaking Project, which will transform Station Street Common into a dynamic public space that will serve as a hub for community events, and bring enhancements to the Station Street/Craig Street crossings and immediate surrounding area. Project completion is expected in Spring 2024. Find out more about this exciting project at: bigconversations.duncan.ca/stationstreet.
- North Beech Avenue Renewal Project is now complete and fully open to the public. We thank the public and especially residents of Beech Ave for your patience and understanding during the construction process.
- The Municipality of North Cowichan's Canada Avenue Flood Gate Installation Project is in full swing with Canada Avenue under a temporary full road closure. The City's watermain replacement portion of this project is complete.
- Work on the University Way Water Main Crossing is underway, with anticipated completion in October. This work will reinforce water supply in the Cowichan Place area for the new Cowichan Secondary School.

NEW SCRAMBLE CROSSING

The City of Duncan is initiating a trial scramble crossing at the intersection of Canada Avenue and Ingram Street to improve safety for all road users, particularly pedestrians.

This month, watch for new signage, road markings and signal phases at this intersection that will include a pedestrian—only phase during which vehicle traffic will be stopped at red lights in all directions. During this phase, pedestrians will be able to cross the intersection in any direction, including diagonally.

We continue to invite feedback on this initiative. Please share your experience with the trial configuration at
