Firefighting is one of the most diverse, challenging and ultimately rewarding undertakings in the world today. As a firefighter, you will respond to emergency events and be part of a team who helps people on the worst day they've ever experienced. It demands personal sacrifice. Emergencies happen every day of the year, at every hour of the day. You'll get paged for an emergency response during family events, at the end of a long workday and in the middle of the night.

It demands courage. Firefighting is inherently dangerous work and involves a myriad of hazards. You'll witness trauma and experience situations that will require you to dig deep and master your fears.

It demands skill. Firefighters need to be confident working in uncertain situations, apply sound judgement and a range of tactics to mitigate emergencies, and creatively solve problems on the fly.

You'll develop an incredibly broad range of skills that will ensure you can safely respond to all types of emergencies, confidently perform under pressure, and that will benefit you in all aspects of your life. You'll directly contribute to community safety by preventing the loss of life, pain and suffering, and minimizing property damage. You'll serve as a role model and experience an unparalleled sense of accomplishment and personal achievement.

OVERVIEW

The Duncan Fire Department, originally known as the Alderlea Fire Company, was formed in 1902. Today it serves the City of Duncan and surrounding area in the Cowichan Valley through mutual aid and service agreements with other governments. The Department is dedicated to protecting the community and its visitors through fire suppression, emergency rescue, fire prevention, education, disaster preparedness and other services.

The Duncan Fire Department is a paid on-call department with a full-time Fire Chief. Annually, the department responds to over 600 emergency calls that range from structure fires, motor vehicle incidents, medical emergencies, technical rescue, and more. Our fleet includes two engines, a tower ladder truck, a tender, and various light duty rescue units.

All firefighters are issued a department-supplied pager to be notified when an emergency call is received, and are expected to quickly report to the fire hall for further information and response. Our firefighters are dedicated and compassionate, and value community, teamwork and respect.

MISSION STATEMENT

The Duncan Fire Department will serve our community in a professional and caring manner, focusing on the safety and preservation of life and property of our citizens.

Objectives:

- To save and protect lives and property during fires and rescue that may occur in the areas covered by the Duncan Fire Department or during Mutual Aid responses;
- To provide training for its members in order to become competent Firefighters; and
- To educate the public in safe fire practices and fire prevention.

COMPENSATION

Our Firefighters are paid-on-call personnel who are compensated for attendance at practice sessions, participating in training and scheduled hall duties, and responding to emergency incidents. There are provisions for overtime pay, responding to calls on statutory holidays, and being on standy-by.

The Duncan Fire Department also provides all required personal protective gear and necessary equipment, and pays for expenses related to training and travel.

When participating in training and hall duties and responding to emergency calls, all members are covered by WorkSafeBC. All Firefighters are entitled to access accidental death and disability insurance and group life insurance policies. Firefighters who do not have access to benefits through their or their family's employment are eligible for Extended Health and Dental Benefits.

Candidate expenses for costs related to medical examinations are reimbursed by the Duncan Fire Department, with prior approval by the Fire Chief.

QUALIFICATIONS

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS

- At least 19 years of age
- Legally entitled to work in Canada
- Reside within 8 kilometres of the Duncan Fire Hall OR live within 20 kilometres and work within 8 kilometres of the Duncan Fire Hall with the ability to leave work to respond to incidents during the day
- Completion of Grade 12 or equivalent
- BC driver's license, unrestricted Class 5, with a driving record that demonstrates safe and responsible driving behaviour
- Ability to pass a medical examination certifying that you are fit to participate in firefighting activities
- Ability to provide a Criminal Record Check and Vulnerable Sector Check with no indication of a criminal record that would adversely affect public trust
- Ability to attend weekly practices each Wednesday from 7:00 pm 10:00 pm

REQUIRED ATTRIBUTES

- Ability to collaborate, work effectively as a team member and actively promote the behaviours and values of an inclusive and respectful workplace
- Ability to take orders and respond effectively in high stress emergency situations
- Ability to make decisions to analyze risks and prioritize safety
- Adaptable to handle unpredictable situations and solve problems creatively
- Strong oral and written communication skills
- Empathy and compassion towards team members and the public

PREFERRED QUALIFICATIONS

- Air brake endorsement
- BC driver's license, Class 3
- First Responder or Occupational First Aid Level 3
- NFPA 1001 Level 2 or other structural firefighting accreditation
- Trades certification
- Ability to safely operate heavy equipment
- Previous firefighting or other emergency response experience
